COMMUNITY IMPACT

For the period July 1, 2021 – February 28, 2022, 65 Mercy Care Volunteers provided friendship and assistance to 89 Elders in our Tri-Lakes communities where they donated 1,365 hours of service, drove 11,940 miles, and completed 1,202 tasks.

The errands of mercy provided by our Volunteers are best illustrated in the words of Mercy Care's Elder Friends, their Families, and their Volunteers:

- From a Family Member: "My mother was an elder in your care for six years. She would not have been able to age in place as long as she did if it weren't for your dedicated, compassionate volunteers. Mercy Care's Age-friendly Communities Initiative helps elders age in place more successfully and empower our communities to become more Age-friendly. Mercy Care for the Adirondacks has received significant grant support from the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation, for which we are most grateful, to extend the model of its Age-friendly Communities Initiative to other communities in the Adirondacks and the North Country. The Mother Cabrini Health Foundation is making possible the dream for Mercy Care to assist more North Country older adults age in place more successfully by helping new communities to establish and operate their own Community Friendship Volunteer programs based on Mercy Care's model of informal social supports.

Mercy Care is providing technical assistance, tools, and training to community partners to achieve the goal. Mercy Care signed a Memorandum of Understanding to assist Community Health Center of the North Country in St. Lawrence County establish its own Age-friendly Communities Initiative serving the communities of Ogdensburg, Massena, Potsdam and Canton. Mercy Care assisted the Health Center with conducting two training classes for Volunteers and developing and participating in a Community Friendship Volunteer Training Program for St. Lawrence University Students. Mercy Care signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Elizabethtown Community Hospital to assist it in establishing their Age-friendly Communities Initiative to help elders age in place more successfully in southern Essex County. And Mercy Care is in the beginning planning stages to assist an organization in Clinton County to establish and operate their own Age-friendly Communities Initiative.

The Mother Cabrini Health Foundation grant is leveraging and honoring the investment by current donors to Mercy Care for the Adirondacks. Mercy Care will continue to need current and new donor support to further develop and sustain its model of direct service and community empowerment in its

core service area of the Tri-Lakes region of the Adirondacks. It remains and will remain Mercy Care's only operational program of direct service to elders, which must be community based to succeed.

PARISH NURSE TRAINING IN THE NORTH COUNTRY

With support from Mother Cabrini Health Foundation, and following a successful Parish Nurse Training in Ogdensburg conducted by Mercy Care in

spring 2021, four Parish Nurses were commissioned by Bishop Terry LaValley. Mercy Care conducted a virtual Parish Nurse Training Program in March and April 2022.

The Parish Nurses trained virtually in March and April 2022 were: Margo Boylan, Linda Giles, Katherine Godley, Heather Hageman, and Jennifer Lucia.

Sr. Catherine Cummings, RSM, Ed.D, R.N. directs Mercy Care's Parish Nurse Program. Mercy Care's Parish Nurse Training Program is open to people of all faiths. We are thrilled to welcome Parish Nurse Educator Consultant, Jane Stratton, to teach Mercy Care's Parish Nurse Training Classes.

Parish Nurses are licensed registered nurses who facilitate holistic health of body, mind, and spirit. They promote health and spiritual healing. They serve as health educators, advocates, health counselors, facilitators, and spiritual caregivers. Parish Nurses do not perform direct

CAREGIVING WORKING GROUP OF ESSEX AND FRANKLIN COUNTIES



July 2021 Caregiving Working Group Meeting of Essex and Franklin Counties

Mercy Care hosted and facilitated meetings for the Caregiving Working Group on January 20, April 21, July 21, October 27, 2021 and January 19, 2022. Presenters included Director of the NY State Office for the Aging, Executive Director of Association on Aging in NY, NY Statewide Senior Action Council Executive Director introducing the proposed Master Plan for Aging included in Governor Hochul's State of the State address, New President and CEO of Adirondack Health, Essex County Director of Public Health on COVID-19 Healthcare Impacts, Caregiver COVID Impacts by Alzheimer's Disease Caregiver Support Initiative, SUNY Plattsburgh, and reports from the Directors of the Offices for the Aging in Essex and Franklin Counties.

Health, Human, and Aging Services professionals from several different counties gather at the quarterly meetings of the Caregiving Working Group to share knowledge and expertise on top-of-mind issues as concern elders.

AGE-FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES EDUCATION NETWORK CREATIVITY IN AGING VOLUNTEER RETREAT - JUNE 16, 2022

How a Caregiver Friend Volunteer can help:

- Family support.
- Social and spiritual enrichment for caregivers.
- Weekly respite care up to 4 hours during the daytime hours.



- In-home supports meal preparation, light house work, laundry assistance.
- Grocery shopping and running small errands.
- Assistance in locating and accessing community services and resources.
